How can Mongolia manage energy demand & prevent power outages?

To manage the energy demand and prevent power outages, Mongolia's Energy Regulation Committee imported more energy from Russia and asked people to follow energy-saving practices. In 2024, energy experts and Mongolia's global partners are urging the Mongolian government to prioritize the energy sector.

How much electricity does Mongolia use per year?

of electric energy per year. Per capita this is an average of 2,191 kWh. Mongolia can partly be self-sufficient with domestically produced energy. The total production of all electric energy producing facilities is seven bn kWh. That is 89 percent of the country's own usage. The rest of the needed energy is imported from foreign countries.

Does Mongolia need a coherent energy strategy?

A cohesive strategy aimed at improving the country's energy sector has become a dire necessity. In November 2023, Mongolia experienced days of intermittent energy shortages.

Who is responsible for Mongolia's energy sector?

In order to ensure this, Prime Minister L. Oyun-Erdene of Mongolia has instructed Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Economic Development Ch. Khurelbaatar and Energy Minister B. Chojjilsuren to take all necessary measures." Mongolia's energy sector writ large is directly linked to Moscow's energy capacity.

What is Mongolia's energy demand?

Currently, Mongolia's energy demand is driven largely by rapid development of the country's mining sector, especially in the South Gobi region as a result of mining activities including gold, copper and coal mines. There is a critical need to modernize the country's ageing energy infrastructure and to expand its power and heat distribution systems.

Are Mongolia's energy policies failing?

In an interview with Bloomberg Mongolia, economist Khashchuluun Chuluundorj highlighted decades of failed energy policies. He said, "Even ten years ago, Mongolian policymakers had the prognosis of increasing energy demand. There have been many project proposals and plans, but unfortunately, none of them have been implemented."

Electric supply of the western Mongolia is dependent from local small scale power generations and power from Russian Federation. If we able to build geothermal power plant in this area, the way to solve the electricity related problems would be taken carry out.
